**Violence against women** is rooted in women's unequal status in society, and that status reflects the unbalanced distribution of social, political and economic power among women and men in society. It is one of the most pervasive human rights violations of our time and a form of discrimination that results in, or is likely to result in, physical, sexual, psychological or economic harm or suffering to women (\*). Violence against women undermines women's dignity and integrity and exposes them to harassment, discrimination and violence. In the EU, estimates suggest that one in three women (or 61 million out of 185 million) have experienced physical or sexual violence, or both, since the age of 15 (%).

In 2012, Gender Equality Index (GEI) it was found that when people tend to have more power in public decisions, levels of disclosed violence are higher (\*). Overall, the EU 17% of women have reported experiencing physical and/or sexual violence (%).

According to Eurostat, from 2010 to 2012, an estimated 1.8 per 100 000 people in the EU were registered as victims of domestic trafficking (%).

In 2012, EIGE estimated that (%):

- The cost of providing legal aid to women in the EU amounts to billions, but the costs incurred by building the cases only amount to nothing.
- Spending on specialised services for women represents just 3 % of the total cost of intimate partner violence against women.
- The loss to the economy through lost output as a result of intimate partner violence (% of the total cost of intimate partner violence against women). Highly affected public can reach up to around 20 %.

The European Institute for Gender Equality has estimated that the cost of intimate partner violence against women in the EU could amount to €109 billion per year (\*).
