

# Good practices in gender training



Several events gathered for EIGE together in Gender today to the EU Mapping research and evaluation engagement (EU-AGE), the online platform provides comprehensive information on gender training in Europe. It also provides some good practice examples in each of the fields and gender competence perspective in specific sectors.

## What resources, tools and methods are being used for gender training?

There are many generic tools, in EU Member State and international level, and gender mainstreaming, some useful resources include:

The GENDER TOOLKIT was developed as a part of the EU-funded 'Fit for Gender Mainstreaming' project (2009-2010) which aimed to foster local and gender mainstreaming strategies through training. The TOOLKIT contains exercises for raising awareness on gender, a gender mainstreaming strategy, a collection of checklists and guidelines, and a materials on facts. The **Compendium of Good Practices in Gender Training** has been developed by UN Women.
