

Who is eligible for parental leave in **Greece?**

Parental leave is granted to parents, usually after maternity and paternity leave, allowing mothers and fathers to take care of their young children without losing their jobs. Such a policy exists in all EU Member States and in Greece it is called $\lambda \delta \epsilon \iota \alpha \ \chi \omega \rho \iota \zeta \ \alpha \pi o \delta o \chi \dot{\epsilon} \varsigma$. The policy design and eligibility rules vary across the EU and not all women and men in the EU are eligible for parental leave.

Parental leave in Greece is:







Unpaid

Leave is an individual right and cannot be transferred between parents

28 % of women and 35 % of men in employment are not eligible for parental leave (1)

This factsheet is based on an eligibility study of how many women and men (aged 20-49) would be eligible for parental leave if they had a child in 2017 and the reasons behind their non-eligibility (2).

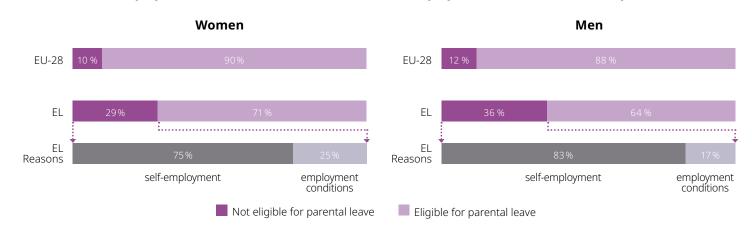

In the EU-28 (4):

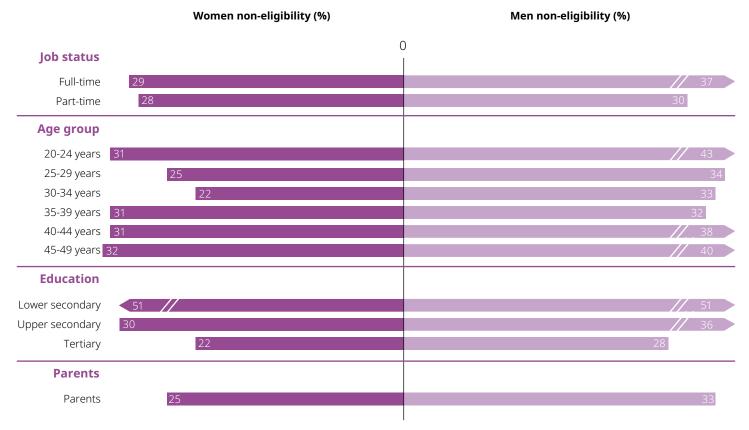
- 15 countries restrict access to employees with short working duration before birth (including Greece)
- The self-employed are not eligible in 10 countries (including Greece)
- 11 countries do not allow access for same-sex parents (including Greece)
- 19 limit access to refugees or asylum seekers (including no access for asylum seekers in Greece)

In Greece, self-employment and duration conditions for the employees restrict the access to parental leave.



- (¹) In Greece, all public-sector employees are eligible for leave. Restrictions apply to private sector workers. Eligibility rates calculated as a weighted average of workforce in public and private sector employment, OECD Government at a Glance 2019
- (2) Restrictions for same-sex couples, refugees and asylum seekers where they apply are not included in the simulations, so underestimates non-eligibility.
- (3) The non-citizens category is multidimensional and cover other EU-28 citizens, 3rd country nationals, refugees and asylum seekers.
- (3) The data was collected before the UK left the European Union.

Who is not eligible for parental leave in the private sector in Greece?



Data on sector of employment not available

In Greece, 24 % of mothers and 33 % of fathers with a co-resident child aged less than 3 years are not eligible for leave, there is a 9 percentage gender gap in access to leave. The gender gap for parents with young children is slightly larger than the national average (7 percentage points).
