- EU policies and programmes shall approach young people's participation in social and political life as a right;
- Digital technologies are becoming more and more important in involving young people in public life but they can only be complementary means to offline activities; they are not a silver bullet and do not reach all young people equally;



- Digital technologies have a potential to meaningfully contribute to fostering not only traditional forms of participation in democratic life, e.g. e-voting, but also volunteering and other forms of involvement in community development;
- There is a need for a quality citizenship education that equips young people with skills and knowledge necessary to adapt in the quickly changing environment brought upon citizens by increased digitalisation affecting all aspects of every day life, including participation;



- Quality citizenship education that empowers citizens to use and access opportunities provided for them through digital means and tools as well as to counter threats that come with increased digitalisation such as unreliable information is needed;
- Citizens should also be empowered to take active role in society by taking a position based on their own critical analyses. Critical knowledge and skills must be accompanied with facilities and tools to address digital illiteracy;



If we really want to make it sure that digital technologies promote involvement of all young people, quality citizenship education, should be based on non-formal education methods;

There should be partnerships established between formal and non-formal education providers, as a majority of youth organisations reach out to young people that are not in formal education.
