From artificial intelligence to blockchain to precision medicine, technologies are transforming societies at high speed. Leaders are confronted with new questions, and the need to decide quickly. People's behaviors undergo fundamental change. Today's institutions were not designed for the digital age. Experts, authorities and regulators now are outscored in credibility by peers and fellow users, a trend facilitated by tech platforms. Artificial Intelligence systems (and the platforms and internet of things (IoT)-sensors which feed data into them) are impacting governments, enterprises, individuals and institutions. Parliaments are expected to be cross-sectional and to lead by example in their compositions, as well as in their internal policies and regulations. However, on average, less than one third of the members of national parliaments in the European Union are women. This highlights a gender imbalance in political representation which is bound to have an impact on parliamentary decisions. That does not mean that a gender-sensitive parliament consists only on having a higher proportion of women. A gender-sensitive parliament is one that removes barriers to women's full participation in the parliament, in decision-making processes and society as a whole; and that strives to respond to the needs and interests of both women and men in its work and structures, across a wide range of portfolios.

To help national and regional parliaments to assess and monitor gender equality within their institutions, EIGE has developed a self-assessment tool that helps collect empirical data to measure the gender sensitivity of their legislative work, their organisational processes and symbolic structures.

In this session, we will discuss the benefits of having a gender-sensitive parliament and how EIGE's tool can be used by parliaments to support advancing gender equality in the European Union and beyond. Join the discussion to find out what does it take to become a leader in gender equality in the political sphere.

Recent exposures of how citizens' data can 'land' on online platforms has put the ethics of digitalisation under the spotlight. The complex online world brings new opportunities for women and men but also many new challenges. It is important to better understand these dynamics. The current trio of the Presidencies of the Council of the European Union (Estonia, Bulgaria and Austria) have decided to focus on digitalisation and its various aspects. According to EIGE's research, currently only 17% out of the 8 million ICT specialists in the European Union are women. The relative absence of women is strongly connected to the perception of the ICT sector as a playground for men. At the same time, there is strong and constantly growing demand for ICT specialists. Forecasts predict a shortage of more than 700,000 ICT specialists by 2020 in the EU.

This session looks at digitalisation from two angles:

- digital skills as a key component in the future of work
- the online world as a channel to participate in political and social life

Join us to discuss how to avoid the ICT skills shortage, how to tap into women's potential, and how to encourage girls to take an interest in ICT early on. We will also look at the main challenges and opportunities for girls and boys in the online world and how these could be addressed.

WOMEN: A POWERFUL FORCE FOR PREVENTING AND COUNTERING VIOLENT EXTREMISM

With the increasing number of attacks carried out by radicalized violent extremists, there has been a growing awareness of how women and girls uniquely suffer from its impact. However, there is much to be learned about the important role that women can, and should, play in countering and preventing it. Viewing women's strengths solely through their traditional roles as wives and mothers significantly undervalues their potential contributions. UNSCR 2242 (2015) has urged states "to ensure the leadership of women in developing strategies to prevent and counter violent extremism," yet women's participation remains elusive. This session will address both the question of why gender matters in PVE and CVE methods, as well as good practices for improving women's political participation in this regard.
